CITY OF JOY for some two decades in the eastem Democratic Republic of the Congo, rape has been a tool of war that has killed or disfigured hundreds of thousands of women and girls. destroyed their homes and upended village life. City of Joy, Madeleine Gavin's Netflix documentary about a safe haven for rape victims. doesn't break news - the sexual atrocities by now are well documented, if largely ignored by the United States and Europe. But her portrait of the City of Joy center, its founder and enablers and, especially, the women who seek its refuse. proves shocking nevertheless. 

SYNOPSIS

The Story of L'Homme Cirque directed by **Michael Flume** is quite simply the charming love story between David, a poor man who is longing to have his own circus and Claudine the daughter of Mr Max, who is to be married to the evil but rich Mr Heinrich whom she does not love. Sounds plain? Believe you me, there is absolutely nothing plain about this unpredictable and wonderful cinematic experience.

This very clever and charming visual delight manages to be strangely relevant and adequate in its form and idea, that it makes us wonder why are we not seeing more of these everywhere.

TDEA

The idea behind this gloriously joyous and charismatic short is to explore and experience the unconventional love story of the aspiring circus owner and the landlord's daughter through the revival of the lost genre of black and white silent films. And I must say, is one of the most entertaining motion picture to be seen in many a moon, especially in the format of a short. The whole concept behind The Story of L'Homme Cirque lies in the atmosphere it manages to create. CINEWATOGRAPHY & EDITING

The brilliance with which each frame is designed and constructed is something no less than marvellous in this very clever flick. We are eased into the film with a couple of beautiful establishing shots which move just so fluently alongside the masterful music that it almost feels as if you are swayed into nothing else but cinematographic magic. And then you are just hooked! Is impossible not to be enchanted by the artistry and depth with which each shot is presented and explored. There is no need for colours when light is so mesmerisingly delved into and used with such infinite bravery. It all looks effortless, and that stands as undeniable proof that complete artistic craftsmanships has been achieved with the display of such visual expressivity.

Nothing is left to chance in this sublime well countered short. The performances of every single character unveiling before our eyes from the episodic blind woman whose face and reactions are so unforgettably authentic, to the main characters whose smallest reactions become so organic and natural in their stylised form is completely fascinating. Inherently the genre of silent film comes with a specific type of performance fully cozed in the characteristics of the time and social context. But to give life and substance and completely immerse yourself in the unnatural until it becomes the natural is simply pure dedication.

All the actors without fail and without exception manage to capture the sheer essence of their characters to the point of full compelling transformation. Undeniably, the gorgeous costumes and precise make-up contribute to a degree to the authenticity of their impersonations but is quite rare to see such versatility and subtly spreading itself to the entire cast without omission.

What continues to surprise however, is the presence of truthfulness in each and every performance. The diversity of the characters and their superb interactions are beyond comparison and are guaranteed to hypnotise and drag you into this strange and bizarrely attractive world.
